<p>United Way of Northern New Mexico: Youth programs and scholarship support awarded in the amount of \$68K. This includes funding a year-round environmental school-based club in Los Alamos and Española, Senior Appreciation Night, and Española Teen Center support.</p>
<p>Los Alamos National Laboratory Community Programs Office: 2008 awarded \$25K for cardio wellness room expansion and in 2010 awarded \$6.5K for a court-build project at Española Teen Center.</p>
<p>Los Alamos Public Schools: Ongoing membership-for-space trade relationship in support of afterschool programming and school employee health and wellness benefits valued serving over 150 teachers.</p>
<p>New Mexico Youth Conservation Corps Commission: Grants of \$149K in 2012; \$123K in 2011; \$121K in 2010; and \$149K in 2009 from state funds a program awarded to the YMCA to provide summer jobs to teens in Española and Los Alamos for conservation programs and collaborative opportunities so youth may work with each other. <p>Los Alamos County: Received \$189,000 contract to facilitate Los Alamos Teen Center.</p>
<p>Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL): Provided 4 computers manufactured in 2008 to the Center.</p>
<p>Los Alamos High School: Donated various items to the teen center, including table tennis equipment, pool equipment, etc. , has also been very kind in letting teen center talk with LAHS students about current projects. They also put up fliers for LA Teen center. We have worked with them on Safe Prom, Safe Homecoming, 5th Quarter, and Senior Appreciation Night.</p>
<p>JJAB: They help fund many programs held at the Teen Center including 5th Quarter, Safe Prom, Safe Homecoming, and Envision Your Future. Also are strong advocates for a new teen center and work regularly on projects with teen center staff.</p>
<p>Family Strengths Network: Funds (through JJAB) Envision Your Future at the Teen Center.</p>
<p>Leadership Los Alamos: Members of Leadership Los Alamos attend teen center stakeholders meetings and are strong supporters of a new teen center.</p>
<p>Key Club: Helped to paint the teen center. Help promote 5th Quarters and other events held at The Hilltop Spot.</p>
<p>DWI Planning Committee: Funded admission for teens to the Aquatic Center for 5th quarter.</p>
<p>Starbucks: Participated in Safe Rave, donated coffee and teas to events held at the teen center. They have donated outdoor furniture.</p>
<p>Teen Court: Sends teens to do community service at Teen Center. This is very helpful in teaching youth a lesson and keeping teen center clean. Also teaches youth doing community service about the teen center, and usually when they are done with community service they become teen center members.</p>
<p>Kiwanis: Helped to paint the teen center. Members have donated time, and are supporters of the teen center. Teen Center Director is a member of Kiwanis.</p>
<p>Los Alamos Family Council: Donated stools, cabinets, and office furniture to The Hilltop Spot. The Restorative Justice Program that is now held at the teen center is run through them.</p>
<p>Los Alamos Community Health Council: Members are strong advocates for a new teen center. Recent health profile states the importance of having a safe place for teens to associate in our community. Teen Center Director is a member of the council.</p>
<p>Trinity On The Hill: Regularly donate food to teen center members. Hold a free lunch for high school upstairs from the teen center during Friday lunch. Members regularly donate time to teen center.</p>
<p>Los Alamos Public Library: Collaborating on a teen center library which is a station at the teen center where teens can take or leave a book. We are also working with the library on future projects to be held at both the library and teen center.</p>
<p>Los Alamos Aquatic Center: Collaborated with them on 5th quarter at the Aquatic Center. Teens were admitted into the aquatic center, given pizza and drinks, and were able to swim and play on inflatable equipment during the event. We will again collaborate with them on an event in February 2012.</p>
<p>Los Alamos Indigent Fund: Collaborated with them on helping move a homeless man into an apartment. Teens from the teen center moved the gentleman's belongings from the woods to a new apartment that was provided by Los Alamos County. This helped to teach teens at the teen center about a way of life that they were not aware existed in Los Alamos County.</p>
<p>Los Alamos Community Members: Donated couches, pool table, air hockey table, printers, ping pong table, PA system, drum set, furniture, hand made chess board.</p>
<p>Los Alamos Youth Activity Center: Donated stools. We have collaborated with them on bringing 8th graders to the teen center for tours to get them familiar with the facility.</p>

Collaborations/Networking at the Y's Española Teen Center

City of Española: 2007 contract to operate the Española YMCA Teen Center. The city provided financial support of 38K/yr in 07, 08, & \$45K beginning 10/09 to current.
